



Indigenous Nations across Canada and around the globe once lived in complex societies, together with the land which was the source of abundance, with vast trade networks that facilitated the exchange of goods, teachings and understandings of how to live a good and healthy life.

Today, many Indigenous communities face significant challenges, including limited access to basic necessities such as healthy food, clean water, adequate housing, and dependable energy. Indigenous children are 89% more likely to develop diabetes in their lifetime. Inconsistent energy sources hinder access to education and stifle local economic opportunities. Overcrowding and unsafe housing conditions put families at constant risk, perpetuating insecurity and hardship.

What we also see is tremendous vision, strength, resiliency and ingenuity. By providing access to the skills, tools, and resources that empower young leaders to be decision makers, communities to rebuild sustainable foundations rooted in culture and the prosperity that the land provides, and ways of connecting, learning and sharing, we can support communities to thrive once again. The solutions are not external, they lie with the people who live this reality daily. There is a lot we can learn from each other. We believe that by working together we can build a future where all are able to fourish and reach their true potential.

WHAT WE DO

Founded in 2014, Global Indigenous Development Trust (GIDT) is an Indigenous non-profit and registered charity created to support the re-building of healthy, natural and prosperous Indigenous communities. We build leadership and development capacity for productive local economies to flourish.

We combine traditional wisdom and contemporary technology and science, enabling Indigenous leaders and entrepreneurs to define their future on their own terms. We connect communities and leaders across the globe to learn from one another and develop a community of wise practice.

GIDT is led by some of Canada's most prominent Indigenous leaders with deep-rooted experience that has lifted entire nations out of poverty and innovated new ways of working together. Our organization has positively impacted more than 100,000 people across 89 communities, trained more than 500 leaders and implemented more than 2 dozen projects and partnerships in the 10 years since its inception.

Building Knowledge and Strengthening Connections

All our projects and programs are guided by Indigenous Elders and Knowledge Keepers, with training for youth, developed through a values-based, cultural lens that prioritizes the inclusion of all voices. We take the time to listen, ensuring that perspectives and wisdom of community members are heard and respected. Our work is centered on providing training and apprenticeship opportunities throughout the entire project life cycle, ensuring that communities and entrepreneurs develop the capacity to lead and own their own projects. By sharing our learnings and project outcomes, we contribute to a national and global community of practice, fostering collaboration and knowledge exchange. There is much to learn from one another, and the support cultivated through these networks underscores the importance of building community wherever we go.

Our Core Areas of Focus



Youth Leadership for Community Impact

Empowering the next generation to take on leadership roles, drive positive change, and have a lasting impact on their communities.

Land

Viewed through a cultural lens, land encompasses not only Mother Earth herself but also wildlife, biodiversity, water, and all of nature's resources. It is integral to the health and sustainability of communities.

Community and True-Value Economies

Supporting the creation of true value economies that honor ecological and cultural assets, using the economy as a tool for enhancing community wellbeing.

Outreach, Education, and Awareness

Building understanding and promoting action on critical issues, with a focus on strengthening connections and fostering a sense of shared responsibility.

The Champions of Change Leadership School at GIDT provides Indigenous leaders and aspiring leaders with leadership and entrepreneurship training through an "Indigenous-to-Indigenous" approach. This program is led by experienced Indigenous leaders and focuses on mentorship, community-building, and empowerment. Participants, drawn from diverse Indigenous communities, learn from each other in small cohorts, ensuring maximum engagement and support.



Core Components

Virtual Leadership School:

A comprehensive, live online learning platform that facilitates dynamic engagement and mentorship.

Online Community of Wise Practice and Learning Hub:

A digital space where students, alumni, instructors, Elders, Knowledge Keepers, and mentors connect, share knowledge, and collaborate.

Un-Learning Resource Library:

A curated collection of Indigenous and non-Indigenous resources, including case studies, templates, training videos, and links to initiatives in green technology, economic development, and more.

Goals

Deliver Advanced Leadership Training: Offering education rooted in Indigenous knowledge and methodologies, aimed at advancing leadership skills.

Build Capacity: Empowering participants with skills in business, community rebuilding, economic development, and resource management.

Create a National Community of Wise Practice and Learning Hub:

Establishing a robust network of Indigenous leaders, entrepreneurs, and mentors to foster continuous learning and collaboration.

Impacts

To date, **64 participants have graduated** from the Champions of Change Leadership School, representing **33 Indigenous Nations across Canada**, with an additional 12 participants from 7 countries across 3 continents. Canadian graduates have come from 9 provinces and territories, with 20 participants graduating in the Spring 2024 cohort. These graduates have gone on to implement meaningful projects that support Indigenous sovereignty and community self-determination. Our success is their success, and the program's impact continues to grow as we empower the next generation of sovereign Indigenous leaders and decision-makers.
















PROJECT SPOTLIGHT

Mno Aki Land Trust



We are thrilled to share significant progress on our ongoing project to secure and maintain stewardship of a beautiful property along the Oak Ridges Moraine Trail in King Township. As a collaborative team, the Mno Aki Land Trust and the Oak Ridges Moraine Land Trust are employing the Two-Eyed Seeing approach to bring this initiative to life.

Building on our initial phase of research, framework development, and outreach, we hosted an inaugural gathering on the lands being donated to Mno Aki in King Township. Supported by the Greenbelt Foundation, we supported Mno Aki to bring together members of the Grandmothers Coucil, Greenbelt Foundation, Oak Ridges Land Trust, Elders, Knowledge Keepers, City Council and Williams Treaty First Naitons members. This exciting initiative blending Indigenous knowledge with Western scientific practices. We are thrilled to announce that we received funding from Natural Resources Canada to build and implement an Indigenous-led framework for mineral exploration that braids traditional knowledge, nature, Western science, and technology.

In our race to a decarbonized future, more minerals are being required than ever before. How do we ensure that we are considering the health and well-being of people and our vital ecosystems now and for future generations?

Led by Tahltan Nation members, guided by traditional wisdom, and working with Green Feet Ecosystem Services, Green Analytics (ecological economics), and leading technologies such as LIDAR, IoT and drones to support decades of traditional knowledge, our goal is to establish a strong reciprocal relationship between our natural world, Indigenous communities and the mining sector.

Our consortium of partners is redefining value and paving a new way of working with natural resources that values our living systems and the wellbeing of local communities.




PROJECT SPOTLIGHT Critical Relationships
